IN PUBLIC POLICY: ADVANCING REPRESENTATION

To build proactive futures, public opinion change needs to be reinforced with policy reform. ISF uplifts American Muslims who work as elected officials, think tank analysts, and university professors to establish socially-just policies that serve the needs and rights of all marginalized communities, including our own. Since 2009, ISF has empowered policy change by:

- Advancing the careers of 311 law and policy alums that work for systemic change, equity, and justice, including the 49 working in government and 5 serving as elected officials
- Placing 62 aspiring attorneys in the legislature
- Placing 3 fellows in congressional offices as part of the nation’s first and only Muslim Congressional Policy Fellowship program

The ISF Congressional Policy Fellowship places American Muslims into congressional offices in Washington D.C. to work on legislative issues. The paid nine-month, full-time program helps fellows secure permanent positions as staffers and builds experience for running for office and working in the administration.

Tahreem Alam / 2022 — 2023

Tahreem Alam serves as a congressional fellow in the Office of Congresswoman Ilhan Omar (MN-05). She is currently obtaining an M.A. in Middle East Studies from George Washington University, and is a 2021 alumna of Virginia Tech where she majored in multimedia journalism, international relations, and Arabic, with minors in women’s and gender studies and Middle East studies. Throughout Tahreem’s academic and professional experience, she wrote for several newspapers as a news reporter and advocated for greater Muslim representation. Her interdisciplinary education and experience fueled Tahreem’s desire to work in public policy at the national level.



Mustafa Alemi / 2020 — 2021

Mustafa Alemi was ISF’s first Congressional Policy Fellow and served in the Office of Congresswoman Rashida Tlaib (MI-13). He is now a JD candidate at the University of Washington School of Law as a William H. Gates Public Service Law Scholar. He has interned in the U.S. House of Representatives as a 2017 ISF Congressional Policy Intern, and he was a Fulbright scholar who served as a teaching assistant in rural Malaysia. Born to Afghan refugees and raised in southern California’s diverse immigrant community, Mustafa intends on utilizing his legal education to protect society’s most vulnerable and advocate for progressive policy reform.

Ala Tineh served as a congressional fellow in the Office of Congresswoman Pramila Jayapal (WA-07). Ala has worked in management consulting at L.E.K. Consulting in Chicago, and The Bridgespan Group in New York, a leading social impact advisor to nonprofits, philanthropists, and investors. Born in Amman and raised in the suburbs of Chicago, Ala has a strong interest in addressing inequities in the American healthcare system by elevating the voices and lived experiences of communities of color.

Legal disenfranchisement is a reality: 46% of eligible American Muslim voters reported difficulties casting their vote in the past four years, compared to 10%-26% of all other groups. ISF works to support the public interest lawyers who advocate for your legal rights.

IN LAW: ADVANCING REPRESENTATION

The law is a mechanism for enshrining social change. Without it, reform is incomplete. ISF uplifts American Muslims who advocate for civil liberties, human rights, and the needs of dispossessed communities. ISF supports the advancement of American Muslims pursuing public interest law by awarding scholarships, placing first-year law students in internships at the offices of district, state, or federal judges, and providing mentorship programs. Since our launch, ISF has supported 91 law students, 65 of whom are practicing attorneys bringing justice to communities across the nation, and one judicial intern placed with a state judge.

The ISF Judicial Internship places first-year law students in internships or externships with a district, state, or federal judge. The internship is an eight-week program that promotes diversity in the judiciary and law profession.

FROM LAW SCHOOL TO SOCIAL JUSTICE

IN FILM: AMPLIFYING VOICES

The history of prejudicial representations in film of BIPOC communities is as long as the history of film itself. And yet film and TV are a central source for American imagination: On any given day, 80% of Americans are immersed in the sights, sounds, and images of new and familiar worlds as they watch an average of 3-4 hours of TV and film a day. But only one percent of characters are Muslims, including the stereotypes.

ISF works to illuminate the richness and diversity of Muslims, from their heritage to their everyday experiences. It empowers Muslim filmmakers to author their own stories and produce Muslim-centered narratives with depth, subtlety, and beauty.

The Artist Support program and **The Writers' Lab** provide American Muslims working in film and television with assistance in developing their projects and fostering creative wellness, community building, and career strategy.

Muslims make up about only 1% of the characters portrayed in the 100 top US films from 2017-2019.

Writers' Lab

In 2022, ISF pioneered and launched the Writers' Lab with support from The Black List and Extracurricular. Led by ISF alums and artists, the Writers' Lab is a Muslim-centered space for filmmakers to develop their craft, receive mentorship by industry professionals, and foster well-being in community with other Muslim creatives.

The Lab creates space for Muslim artists to restore, define, and center their narratives. Fellows received craft-to-pitch guidance from educators Q. Terah Jackson, Karim Ahmad, and Erika Kennair. Fellows received mentorships Carlos López Estrada (*Blindspotting*, *Summertime*), Tanuj Chopra (*Delhi Crime 2*, *Punching the Sun*), and ISF's own Director of Film Programs and Filmmaker, Iman Zawahry.

Nobel-Prize-winning novelist Morrison once declared that “the very serious function of racism is distraction,” which keeps a community apologizing for the narratives written about it from the outside. ISF believes in a proactive, not reactive, public impact. We believe in authoring our own stories. That’s why we amplify the work of journalists, novelists, poets, and writers through scholarships and mentorship programs that elevate their work changing public opinion through storytelling. Since our first launch, 87 ISF Media Alum have changed the narrative by publishing over 3,000 articles.

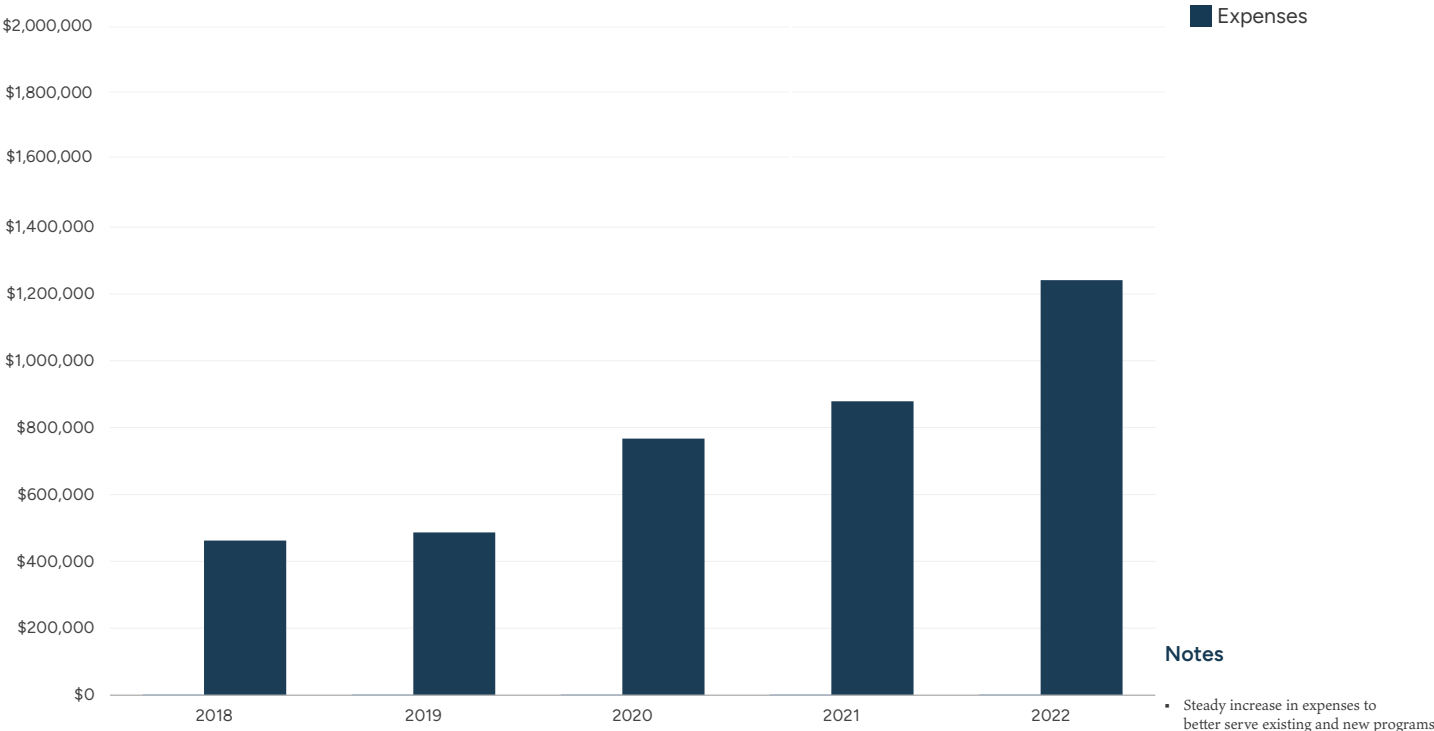

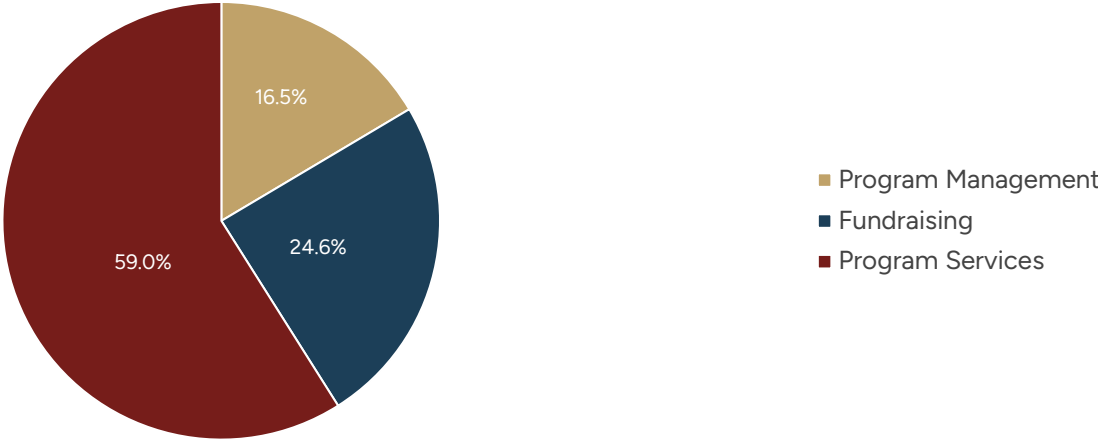
REVENUE YEAR COMPARISONS



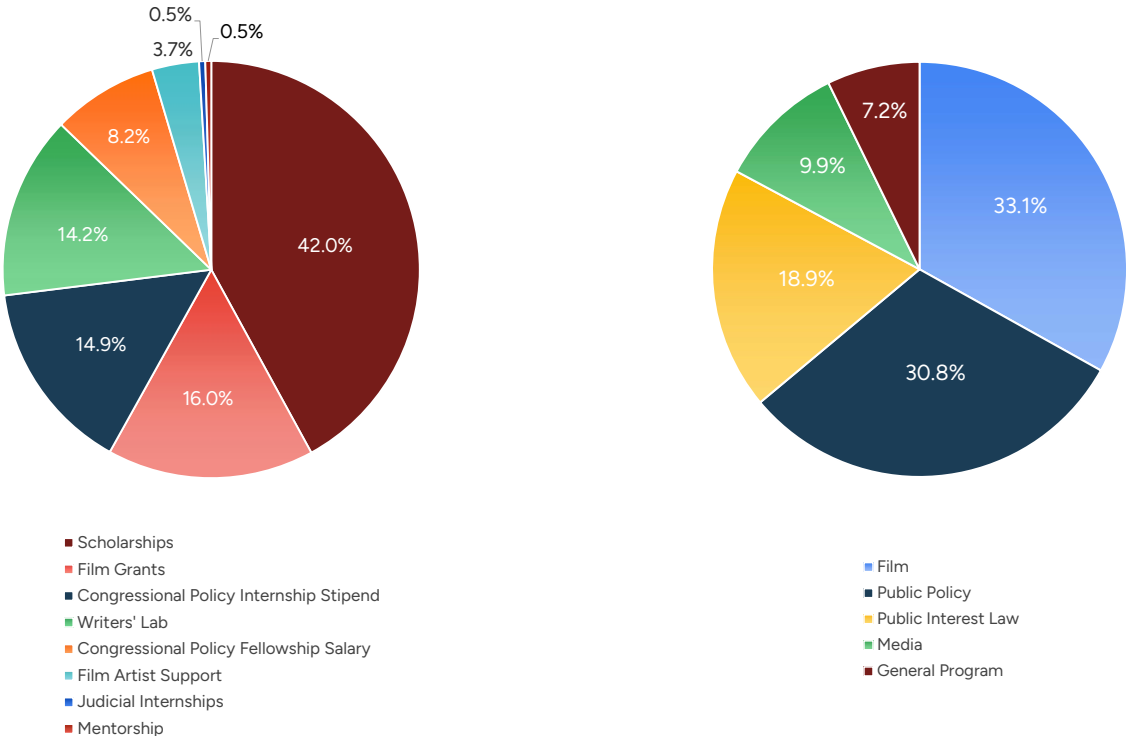
EXPENSES YEAR COMPARISONS

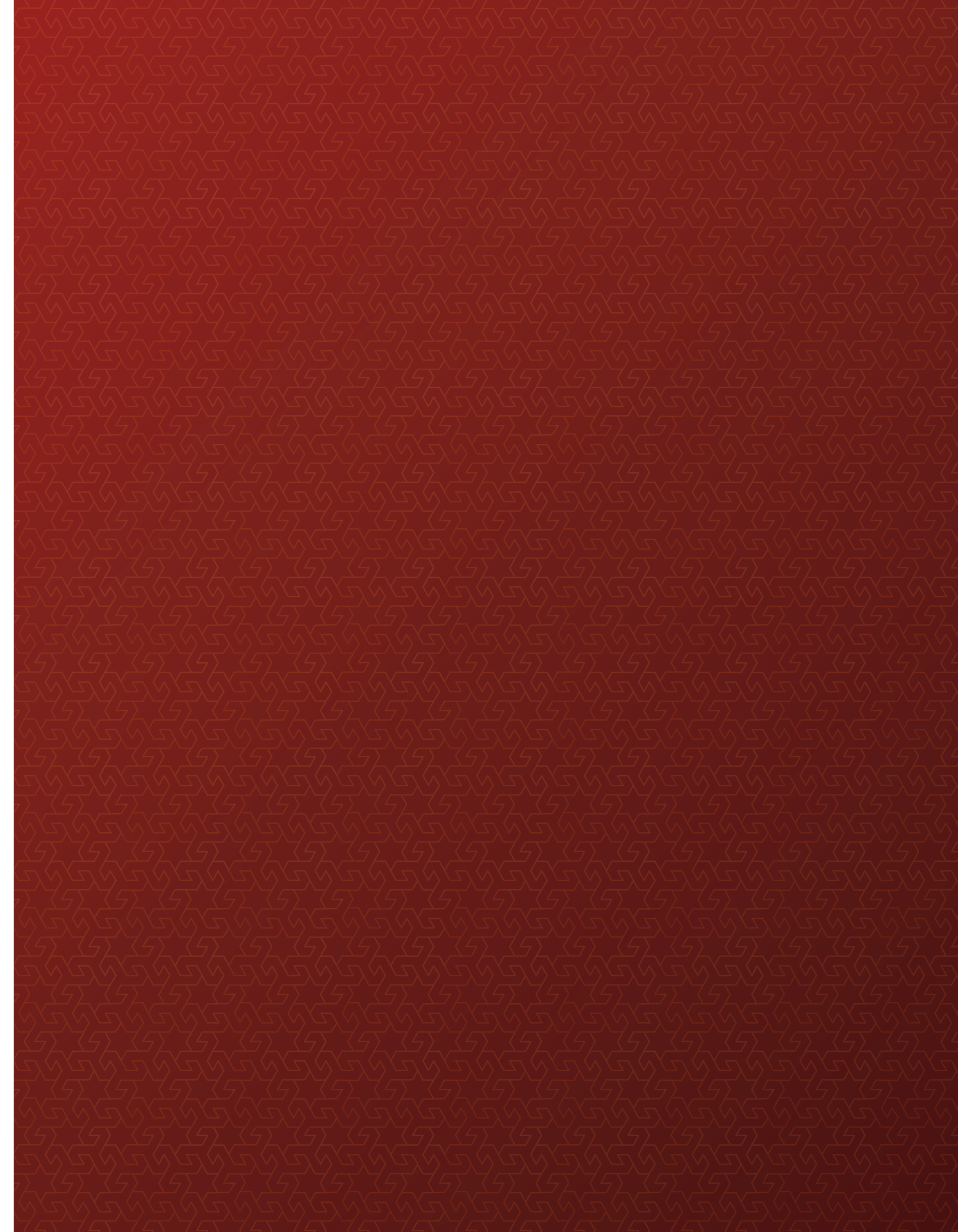


FUNCTIONAL EXPENSE ALLOCATION MIX
